LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

Dear Members and Neighbors.

As some of you are already aware, the University Heights Association, Inc. is in a bit of a pickle. Our organization is facing a potential crisis regarding the vacant lot on the corner of Radcliffe and Columbia. What many do not realize is that it is our neighborhood association, not the trustees of the subdivision, who own it. In fact, we have owned it since 1976 without encountering any trouble. But the situation changed dramatically in 2001 when St. Louis County reassessed the lot and its appraised value changed from ~\$12,000 to ~\$80,000. With the new value, the property taxes jumped from ~\$200 to ~\$1,200 in 2001 and 2002, and to ~2,200 in 2003. Our organization could never afford such a tax. Once we discovered the rate change, we voted to apply for an exemption from property tax on the lot based on the fact that we are a not-for-profit organization. Janet Schaper took the time to compile the information necessary and submitted the appeal. It took nearly a full year to reach the hearing phase of the process. In late September of this year, a small group of members appeared before the County Board to plead our case. Unfortunately, it was rejected. We are now in the process of appealing their decision. At the last board meeting we all agreed to try to find a lawyer with an expertise in such matters. Thankfully Judy Baernstein found just such a lawyer who we hired to draft the appeal letter. His idea was to argue that the lot serves as common ground to all in the subdivision and thus we all pay its tax each time we pay our property taxes on our own lots.

It should take a few months to hear their decision. If it succeeds, we can return to spending our time planning events and enjoying neighborly hospitality. If it fails, we will face some very difficult decisions in the next year.

As of October, the Association's bank account held ~\$3,000. Research online reveals the assessment for the lot to increase again for our 2003 taxes. We have not paid the taxes for 2001 or 2002 pending the appeal. Quick math makes clear that we cannot meet these debts. If we are to maintain the lot as a "common ground" we will need to take fundraising to a whole new level. Each member of the University Heights Association will need to seriously consider whether owning the lot is essential to our existence and if so determine a way to make it feasible and not a burden. WANT TO KNOW ABOUT OUR CITY COUNCIL?

The Council is the legislative and governing body of the City of University City. The City Council enacts legislation to protect the health, morals and general welfare of the citizens of the City. The Council appoints both the City Manager and City Clerk. The City Council has seven members, one of whom serves as mayor. Each of the City's three wards has two representatives, who are elected to four-year terms. The Mayor, Joseph Adams, leads the city Council Meetings, which are generally held twice monthly on Mondays (check with City Hall for specific schedule). These meetings are open to the public and there is an opportunity for residents to voice their opinions or concerns.

University Heights is in Ward Two. Our council members are currently Shelley Welsch and Wayne Munkel. Shelley has made communication with residents a high priority and has an email newsletter available to everyone. Additionally, she emails a bulletin board of U. City events. Furthermore, Wayne Munkel will not be running for reelection, so if anyone is interested, please contact City Hall.

LEAF COLLECTION

U. City has three pick-ups scheduled for this fall. They partition the city in the three sections, East, Central and West. University Heights, being in the East, has the first collection. Unfortunately, there were not too many leaves on the ground for the first pick-up. If you remember, last year the same thing happened, and the City ended up adding one additional pick-up for the East to accommodate the late falling leaves. This issue was brought up to our councilwoman, Shelley Welsch, and her response was that when originally scheduled, a survey was done of the types trees that were in our area, and it was decided that those types dropped leaves early. They have concluded that they need to re-survey the trees to ensure that they are scheduling at the best times. This may result in only two pick-ups.

Our next, and last scheduled pick-up is November 17th. But remember, if you miss the pick-up, you can bag your leaves and you do **NOT** need a yard waste sticker in the months of November and December.

YARD WASTE STICKERS

Yard waste sticker vendors have increased. For the convenience of U. city residents, the Public Works Department has expanded the number of locations where yard waste stickers are sold.

Under the yard waste program, residents must place leaves, twigs, plants or small brush in 30-gallon biodegradable bags and each bag must have a yard waste sticker attached.

Stickers are NOT required in November and December.

The yard waste collected from residents is used in the city's composting program and is available at no extra cost to residents. For information, call 863-3208, ext. 315.

The University City High School Hall of Fame is a tribute to our graduates who have shown exceptional personal, community or professional achievements. UCHS and the School District of University City want to honor our outstanding alumni who serve as an inspiration to current and future UCHS students.

If the halls of University City High School (built in 1915) could talk, they would tell of the near century of history, tradition, and legends – legends of students who have gone on to achieve great things personally, professionally, or philanthropically. This year, thanks to the development of a Hall of Fame, the halls will talk, and today's students will listen to lessons taught by some of the school's highest achievers.

The impressive list of inductees includes a great American playwright,

business leaders, Pulitzer Prize winners, philanthropists, an Academy Award nominee, sports legends, musicians, advocates, activists, physicians, politicians, a Rhodes Scholar, music promoters, architects and builders, authors, journalists, a mountain climber, attorneys, a rabbi, educators, volunteers and organizers of volunteers, a television pioneer, artists, a newspaper publisher, and a U.S. Circuit Court judge.

This year, one of University Heights residents, Paul Schoomer, class of 1957 will be honored with this induction. Paul has been a long-time Princeton resident, Trustee, and former Councilman. Paul also was the Grand Marshal for the Homecoming Game on October 25th.

The 2003 inductees also include affordable housing advocate Charles Edson, class of 1952; hip-hop rapper Cornell "Nelly" Haynes, class of 1993; geneticist Dr. Ira Herskowitz (awarded posthumously), class of 1963; art ambassador Nancy Spirtas Kranzberg, class of 1962; baseball pitcher Robert Person, class of 1987; and tennis guru Mark Platt, class of 1973.

I CAN SAVE PROGRAM--The kindergarten and first-grade students at Delmar-Harvard Elementary School have been handed an incredible opportunity. At the start of the 2003-2004 school year, a four-year project entitled "I Can Save" was launched at the school. Through "I Can Save," a special college savings account is opened for the students. An initial deposit of \$500 is placed in the account, and any savings deposited into the account will be matched. At the end of four years, the child's total savings account will be deposited into a Missouri 529 plan. "I Can Save" is operated by Beyond Housing/Neighborhood Housing Services in partnership with Delmar-Harvard Elementary School, the University-Community Achievement Partnership, and Commerce Bank. To quote Dr. Gonzalez-Rubio, Principal at Delmar-Harvard; "With I Can Save, it will no longer be a question of IF my child will go to college, but WHERE my child will go to college!"




