


FENCE TALK JULY-AUGUST, 2001

NEIGHBORHOOD PICNIC

The annual University Heights neighborhood picnic will be held Sunday, September 16th. (Rain Date is October 7th).

PARADE

The parade begins at 3:30pm at Yale/Cornell/Princeton. Decorate your bike, your big wheel, yourself, your dog, your Mom and Dad, whatever, and meet at the corner before 3:30. Bring kazoos, musical instruments, noise makers. If you don't want to walk, come out to watch. The annual buttons will be handed out to all paraders and spectators.

POTLUCK PICNIC

After the parade, there will be just enough time to go home and get your goodies for the picnic and return to Lewis Park. The U Heights Association provides hot grills, cold beer and soda, nametags, games, music and other amenities. Each household is asked to bring a pot-luck dish (salad, vegetable, casserole or dessert) big enough to serve 10-12 people. You also need to bring your own main dish or meat to grill, plates and utensils. If you bring your own drinks, please remember that glass containers are not allowed in the park. There will be extra tables in the park, but many people prefer to bring their own picnic blanket or chairs. Don't forget insect repellent!

The U Heights picnic is not just for kids and not just for families. It is for all residents, old, young, single, married, new neighbors, old timers, former neighbors, everyone!

TRUSTEE'S REPORT

Ron Scott has expressed dismay that 9 of our new street signs (black with reflective white lettering) are already missing. Replacement cost \$200/sign--a total of \$1800 plus installation that must be paid from our dwindling assessment funds. PLEASE, PLEASE if you see or hear anyone dismantling or vandalizing street signs or ornamental lights, immediately call 911. If anyone should find any of our street signs in their basement or kids rooms (Please look!), return them to Ron ASAP. The trustees will only press charges against those caught by U City Police after a 911 call. Ron has requested that the U City Police be on the alert for these thefts and vandalism, as well as other traffic violations by residents or visitors to our neighborhood. comments, ideas, contact Ron at 725-0893.

The trustees have also negotiated with the city to repair the drainage problems leftover from our new street project, to patch the holes by the ornamental lights, and to patch other problem areas in the streets.

Due to our meager budget, the trustees and Droege Tree Service have identified the tree lawn trees 'most in need' of trimming or removal, and Droege should trim or remove them in October.

NEIGHBORHOOD PLANNING

I want to take this opportunity to thank all of you who responded to the planning survey. Many neighbors added additional ideas that were great, and they mentioned that they appreciate having the opportunity to voice their opinions about our neighborhood. I think that most of the items on the list will need to be completed at some time within the next 5 years. However, per the survey, the top priority items in order are as follows: 1. Maintenance of the streets; 2. Updating the indenture and increasing the neighborhood assessment; 3. Replacing dead trees; 4. Replacing sidewalks; 5. Continuing the FenceTalk. So, as many of you figured, this information is no big surprise!! The next question we need to ask ourselves is, "Money?" If you have done or are planning to do improvement on your house, you have come to the realization that it sometimes takes a lot more moolah than you might have thought. This is the same with our neighborhood maintenance and improvements. The even bigger

questions are "How much money do we have?" "How much money do we need?" "How much do we collect annually per our current assessment rate?" "How much do each of the needed items really cost?" "How much do we not collect annually?" "What are our fixed expenses and how much do they cost us each year?" "How are items prioritized?" "How much longer before we update the indenture?" "Exactly, how many more signatures do we need to move forward with the assessment increase?" So many questions! In upcoming articles in FenceTalk we will try to explore the answers to some of these questions and provide some important information about our financial status and how do we compare with other private neighborhoods within our area. Hopefully, with the neighborhood input and feedback we will have a majority of our neighbors moving in the same direction. This is everyone's neighborhood and I think we should all have a part in some of our planning decisions and money decisions.

RECYCLING NEWS

<u>Electronics Recycling Fair</u> Fri-Sun 9/21-9/23, St. Louis County residents may drop off old small electronics at Heman Park in front of the Recreation Facility at 7120 Olive. Items should be placed in the trunk of a car for removal by staff.

<u>Textile Recycling</u> clothes, shoes, linens, rags and curtains may be dropped off between 8am and 4:30pm in a bin at the Heman Park parking lot in front of the Recreation Facility at 7120 Olive.

LEAF PICKUP

The City will pick up leaves curbside three times in University Heights: The weeks of October 8, October 29 and November 26. You may rake leaves to the curb the weekend before pickup (but please not prior to that weekend). The City's vehicles will come by sometime during that week. The leaves are put in piles at Heman Park, and made available to residents in the spring in the form of leaf mulch (also known as 'black gold' to some of our better gardeners). Be careful not to park on the piles of leaves during pickup time. Heat from your car's engine can easily ignite leaves!!
